Ways To Praise

Beginning in October Good Shepherd will offer a 5:00 PM service every Sunday, the service will be called "Ways To Praise". I hope in this article to explain, via a questions and answers format, how this service came to be and what it will look like week to week and month to month.

Why should Good Shepherd have a fourth Sunday service (in addition to 7:40 AM Morning Prayer, 8:00 AM Said Rite 1 Eucharist and 10:00 AM Sung Rite 2 Eucharist)?

First, one of the constants of a living and active church is that it constantly finds new ways to meet the needs of people seeking to have a closer relationship to Jesus. In practical terms that often means finding ways to offer worship, fellowship, and educational opportunities that enable our members, friends, and neighbors to be with us every week, regardless of the other commitments they have in their lives. A Sunday morning or Holy Day church service is one of a number of commitments (including but not limited to educational, community, and recreational events) that people have marked on their calendars each week. I don't think it's a coincidence that in the last two years, we have not had a single service that was attended by every single one of our regular



Outreach News

The Outreach Committee had a productive meeting on September 11th and we had follow-up meeting on September 25th. At these meetings we got a good start on planning our calendar for the year. Thanks to all who attended and/or provided suggestions. This is an overview of what was covered at these meetings.

What does outreach mean for us at Good Shepherd today? Participants shared that they find us to be a giving community. Our church family actively goes out making connections with others, enriching both parties in the process. Outreach was described as having layers, like an onion, as we care for our church family, the local community, and then much further from home. It is also the outward sign of Good Shepherd representing the body of Christ as we move about in the world.

A possible new direction for the future of outreach at Good Shepherd was discussed. Our goal is that the entire parish, from the youngest to the oldest, will find an outreach activity that speaks to them and they will want to take part. Committee members suggested that the focus move away from fundraising and toward relationship building. Although we are asked to share our treasure with those less fortunate, we hope to reach into your hearts more often than your wallets!

Our first big project will be the Holiday Sharing Drive, sponsored by the Junior League of Northern Westchester. Thank you to Kathleen Parsons for suggesting this activity and volunteering to coordinate things! Families in need are identified

worshippers. I'd be shocked if any church anywhere could state that on a given Sunday every single person was there. People can't always make it church on Sunday morning, but that doesn't mean that they don't want to come to church. Reflecting this reality, a number of parishioners have expressed to me their hope that it might be possible at some point to have a regular or even an occasional evening service.

The second answer to why we need another worship opportunity on Sunday is that the parish has grown dramatically in the last two years. We have doubled our Sunday attendance. The church is not bursting at the seams on Sundays, but we are averaging over 100 people every Sunday of the year. The energy, activity, and happiness that is visible every Sunday at Good Shepherd means that right now is a great time to build on that growth. By opening the church doors at another time and in a new way we can make it easier for even more people to come through them and discover the joys of being part of the Good Shepherd family.

The third answer is that there is a real hunger at Good Shepherd for worship and prayer opportunities that nourish us in different ways. When I was in New York City, I really enjoyed concluding every Sunday with a quiet and beautiful prayer service. It complimented the Sunday morning service, and beyond that it allowed me a time for reflection and quiet prayer that simply was not possible during the "wild and crazy" morning Eucharist. I love our Sunday morning services; I think they illustrate what an ideal church community can look like, but I recognize that in the midst of our normal 10:00 AM hustle and bustle it can be difficult finding lots of space for reflection, mediation, and silence. We have the chance to offer an intentionally different worship environment on Sunday evenings, an environment that can focus on light, darkness, sound, silence, reflection and quiet prayer. The traditional liturgies and worship opportunities of the church are not limited to Holy Communion. Our identity as members of the Body of Christ who gather together at our Lord's Table is without a doubt the starting point of Christian Community, but historically the church has



found many other ways to strengthen the bonds we have with each other and move towards a deeper understanding of the mystery of the Incarnation and our identity as children of God.

With that in mind, it made sense to offer a 5:00 PM service every Sunday evening, a service that was different from our morning services. That decision raised a number of new questions: Is 5:00 PM the best time? How long will it be? Who will lead it? What will it look like? What will it feel like? Will it vary in form seasonally or not?

Why 5:00 PM? Every Sunday and Wednesday evenings our buildings are offered to Alcoholic Anonymous groups. That ministry means that use of the parking lot and church facilities is extremely limited between 6:00 PM and 9:00 PM. Offering a service between 6:00 PM and 9:00 PM was therefore off the table from the beginning. Offering a service after 9:00 PM seems, to me at least, boneheaded and doomed to failure. Offering a new Sunday service any earlier than 5:00 PM essentially means offering an afternoon, rather than evening service. Sunday afternoons in Westchester tend to be reserved for football, errands, recreation, and returning from vacations, so the mid-afternoon is also off the table. So, 5:00 PM it is, and honestly, if I could have chosen an ideal time, it would have been 5:00 PM anyway: it's before dinner, it's just about halftime in the second NFL game so I won't miss anything important in the game, and the recreation of the afternoon is usually over.

How long will it be? A 5:00 PM service cannot be much more than a half hour for two reasons. The first is practical: AA begins to setup around 5:30 PM and people attending meetings start arriving around 6:00 PM, so we need to be finished before they arrive. The second is pastoral: no worship service should ever be longer than it needs to be. I think a half hour (or less) in church is an effective close to the day. Short and sweet works equally well for a person who wasn't able to make it earlier in the day and for a person who was present for the morning Eucharist and all of the social activities that surround it. I want to aim for 20-25 minutes. Sometimes, by necessity,

anonymously through local agencies. Good Shepherd parishioners will be given an opportunity to "adopt" one of these families for the holidays, which involves providing food for a holiday meal and a gift for each family member. Donors can specify the size family they would like to choose; from one person to six or more. Parish families can also adopt a family together to help manage the expense. Good Shepherd groups might like to consider adopting a large family together or purchasing a big-ticket item. **A sign-up sheet and more details will be available on the bulletin board and in Sunday announcements.**

Other upcoming outreach activities will include **helping the local food pantry** with fresh produce for the holidays and a **Sunday school project** to benefit the Episcopal Church in Jerusalem. **Watch for information about these and other outreach opportunities.**

On December 18th, we will begin to meet quarterly to plan an outreach focus for the coming months. We welcome all suggestions. Additionally, if anyone knows of a speaker who could enrich a particular focus topic, please talk to us about inviting them for a coffee hour presentation! An outreach coming events calendar will appear each month in the Shepherd's Voice, previewing the next six weeks (see the next page). This will be a great reference for all outreach activities. Please send information about your activities that you would like to have included in the newsletter to us so that they can be entered into the calendar. it will stretch a bit longer, but if you aim to keep it short, even when it's "long", it's still short.

Who will lead it? I don't like doing things half-way or in-part. For some churches and rectors it may make sense to offer a service once a month or to cancel or modify service times in the summer, but that doesn't work for me. I can never remember that we are on the first or third or whatever Sunday of the month, and every time I've been to a church that changes to a summer schedule I arrive an hour late for half of the summer because I'm a creature of habit. If I am on vacation or if I am sick or if I am away for some reason, I think it's important that we continue to offer all of the services that we normally offer on Sunday. Since we are not going to hire a supply priest for a 20 minute service, this evening service needs to be something that can be led by someone who is not a priest. I am happy to lead the service; I am also happy to create an opportunity for the members of the parish to take on the responsibility of ensuring that this service is offered year-round. Some weeks I will probably be the Officiant, other weeks a member of the parish will be the Officiant. Whenever I am here, regardless of whether I am the Officiant or not, I will be at the service.

What will it look like? What will it feel like? Will it vary in form seasonally or not? These are related





questions. Since a priest will not lead it every Sunday, it cannot be a service of Holy Communion. That's OK: Holy Communion is not the only service that Christians gather together for. In Lent, Christians traditionally walk the Way of the Cross (also called Stations of the Cross). In Advent and Christmas, Christians have long enjoyed services of Lessons & Carols. For hundreds of years English speaking Christians have gathered together on Sunday evenings for services featuring scripture, prayer, and song (commonly called Evensong). Those are some examples of the huge variety of services that we can do, and within the limits of our space and window of time, we can and will offer many of these different services. Though they all feel and look quite different, they are all part of our rich Christian and Anglican tradition. Due to this great and wonderful variety, we are calling the 5:00 PM Sunday evening service "Ways To Praise". Aside from the obvious catchiness of the rhyme, "Ways To Praise" is an accurate description of what we will offer. Each season we will offer a different way to praise God and gather together in the name of Christ.

Our kickoff Sunday will be October 2. We will offer a short service of Evening Prayer with the Blessing of Animals on the front lawn at 5:00 PM. If it rains, we will offer this service in the church. Though the service includes the blessing of animals, you don't need to bring an animal. If you will be one of our Support Connection Walkers who plans to spend the morning walking in Yorktown, I hope you will be able to come to Good Shepherd and experience the first "Ways To Praise" service. Bring your animal, bring a camera and take some photos, or just show up and close out the day gathered together for prayer with other friends from Good Shepherd.

Beginning on Sunday, October 9 and continuing until the end of November we will offer a Service of Light, which will be advertised as "Lighten Our Darkness". This Service of Light will be taken directly from the Order for Worship in the Evening found on page 109 of the Prayer Book. At 5:00 PM we will gather in the church which will be illuminated primarily by candle light (only necessary overhead lights will be lit). The service will begin with a brief passage from Scripture and a Prayer invoking the Presence and Light of Christ. We will then sing the ancient Hymn of Light (set to a

House of God

The buildings of Good Shepherd look alive in ways that they did not look at the start of the summer. I was struck a few weeks ago that the church looked more like a house than it had. As I stood staring at the new roof, trying to figure out what it was that had caught my eye, I realized that the roof no longer had a "slapped on" look to it. The roofers had built a new layer between the decking and the roof, a space that appears to be about 8 inches thick filled with insulation. I wondered why it looked "right" with that added layer.

My question was answered later that day as I drove around town. This layer housing the insulation isn't uncommon; it's on every single home in town. The only buildings that I saw in Granite Springs that didn't have a layer filled with insulation were barns and sheds. Visually, the church has transformed from a shed or a barn or a simple gathering place... into a house. That simple change



not only makes the church look more like a house, it also makes the church feel more like a home. In the summer our parish home will insulate us from the hot sun; in the winter our parish home will protect us from the cold and snow (and cost less to do so). From now on, when I hear the phrase "House of God" I will think of the day that I looked up for the first time and to my amazement saw that Good Shepherd had literally become a house.

The roof does not make the church a House of God; like any good sign, it clarifies and points to a present reality. The new roof helps to make clear that Good Shepherd is a home for the people of God to praise the risen Lord Jesus, that it is a house of God, and in fact that it is a Church where the Word of God is living and active.

I'm so happy that we have a new roof, and I am grateful to all of those who made this wonderful transformation happen this summer. There are many people to thank, too many to name, but I would like to single out Bruce Barber, our Property Warden, for making it all happen.

very simple and traditional tune). After the hymn the People and Officiant will recite a short selection of Psalmody, and then the Officiant will read the appointed evening Gospel passage. After the Gospel we will offer an intentional time of silent reflection – in the midst of the darkness with only the light of candles and the quiet still of the evening, our prayers and thoughts will ascend to God the Father. After a few minutes of silence, the Officiant will lead the People in the traditional Canticle and Prayers for the Evening. The service will conclude with one of the traditional hymns for the close of the day. From start to finish it will be between 20 and 25 minutes every Sunday.

In Advent we will offer a brief Service of Lessons & Carols. Advent Lessons and Carols services have a beautiful simplicity: the combination of the cold weather, the candle light, the carols and the lessons all bringing Christmas ever closer is a highlight for many Christians each year. Likewise Christmas Lessons and Carols have long been a favorite for Christians. Our only limitation is the duration of the service. But, that should be a boon rather than a bane. Because Advent is a four week season, we will be able to spread out the traditional carols and lessons over the season without repeating much at all. Christmas Day and New Year's Day both fall on Sunday this year, which means that we have the opportunity to do something on New Year's Day or perhaps New Year's Eve.

Looking ahead, parts of 2012 can be sketched out as well. In the midwinter months between Christmas and Lent (throughout most of January & February) we plan to once again offer a Service of Light. It is likely that this service will undergo a few modifications and improvements, and certainly there will be readings and music that are seasonally appropriate. In Lent we plan to offer Stations of the Cross. In Eastertide we plan to offer Eucharistic Exposition & Benediction. In the summer months we plan to offer a short evening prayer service in the Memorial Garden.

If you are interested in helping plan "Ways To Praise" in Advent, Christmastide and 2012 please contact me and plan to come to the Ways To Praise planning meeting at 9:00 AM on Sunday, November 13. If you are interested in helping out



as an Officiant (it's EASY and lots of FUN!) please contact me any time.

There are many ways to praise God, and at Good Shepherd each Sunday morning we will continue offering the Holy Communion in all its glory. In addition to that, or on those Sundays that you just aren't able to be present for the main Sunday service, you can join me and (I hope) many others exploring and being nourished by some of the other traditional prayer services that have fed Episcopalians and so many other Christians. We begin this Sunday at 5:00 PM with the Blessing of Animals & Evening Prayer, and on October 9 we will offer our first Service of Light. If you are creature of habit, like I am, add 5:00 PM to your internal list of Good Shepherd Sunday services: Every Sunday, rain or shine, winter or summer, we offer a service at 7:40 AM, 8:00 AM, 10:00 AM, and 5:00 PM.
