## ***FROM THE RECTOR: OUTREACH & INREACH***

A recent conference on Church growth noted that churches that do not actively work at charitable outreach do not grow. I'm very happy to be the rector of Good Shepherd, in part, because we are growing and we actively work at charitable outreach. In addition to our annual efforts supporting the Carpenter's Kids (see the letter on pages 7-9 of this newsletter) Good Shepherd is offering several important outreach projects in the next month.

**On Thursday, March 25, we will celebrate the Feast of the Annunciation of Our Lord Jesus Christ with the Holy Eucharist and a wine tasting fund raiser.** At 6:00 PM we will gather for worship in the church. The service will be sung and will feature a guest preacher, the Reverend John Merz. Father Merz is the chaplain at New York University for

the Diocese of New York. He will also be at Good Shepherd in July as our assistant supply priest. After the service concludes there will be a wine tasting in the Parish Hall. A minimum suggested donation of \$20 is asked to raise funds for the parish and for two specific outreach projects: The Keon Center and the Northern Westchester Community Center Food Pantry in Katonah. Wine will be sold at the wine tasting and both a portion of the proceeds from the wine that is sold and the money offering from the Holy Eucharist will go toward this fundraising effort.

**On April 1, 2010, the church celebrates Maundy Thursday.** (More information on the service is below in the section on the Easter Triduum). The offering at the 7:30 PM Celebration of the Lord's Supper traditionally goes directly to the poor. This year, the entire offering will be given to two outreach efforts: the Northern Westchester Community Center Food Pantry in Katonah and Episcopal Relief & Development's Haiti Fund.

**On Sunday, February 14, 2010, the Last Sunday after Epiphany, the Sunday School offered a chocolate fountain fundraiser which raised over \$250.** The proceeds were given to Episcopal Relief & Development's Haiti Fund. Thanks so much to all who contributed and to all who made this wonderful event happen.

Inreach may or may not be a real word, but at Good Shepherd we actively practice both charitable outreach and charitable inreach. The Family Support Fund is a parish fund that is designed to assist members within our own parish family in times of need. Currently, the Fund has a little less than \$2000 in it; I would like to make a specific appeal to every member and friend of the parish, who are able to, to support and contribute to this Fund. It is my hope that by June 20, 2010, when Bishop Sisk visits for Confirmations, we can double the amount of money in the Fund. I hope you will join me in making a donation to the Family Support Fund: please make checks payable to the "Church of the Good Shepherd" with a note designating "Family Support Fund".

These outreach and inreach efforts are only possible when we work together. Supporting the parish financially allows us to keep the building open and staffed so that we can gather and begin to live out Christ's command to love our neighbors. Our pledge goal for 2010 is \$120,000. We are currently at \$88,654 (74%)! Making our goal allows us to balance to continue to do the many different outreach projects we are doing... and then do even more! If you haven't yet made a pledge, please consider making one – please speak to Bob Bubeck or to me, the rector. A pledge supports the entire mission of the church and makes the charitable outreach and inreach projects that we do possible. Thanks so much and God bless!

## ***HOLY WEEK & EASTER***

*Below are a few reflections for Holy Week and Easter. They are expanded and adapted from descriptions of the service originally written for the bulletins for each service by the Reverend Stephen Gerth, rector of Saint Mary the Virgin, in Times Square. Father Gerth is my former rector and he will be preaching at my Institution service on April 16. The services of the Easter Triduum are awesome and worth taking a few evenings off to participate in, please mark your calendars if you are able to attend. Let the Spirit move you!*

## ***THE SUNDAY OF THE PASSION: PALM SUNDAY***

Palm Sunday, March 28, 2010, begins Holy Week. The Sunday of the Passion was the Church’s first “Good Friday.” This celebration continues to this day. Since the fourth century the Church has also celebrated the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem on the Sunday before he was crucified. In the Episcopal Church this day is known as “The Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday.” The liturgy recalls both the final entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem and his death on the cross and burial. Following the Blessing of Palms, the congregation processes into the church where the Passion is celebrated at the Holy Eucharist. On Passion Sunday, one Passion narrative is read (with members of the congregation playing all of the important parts) in it’s entirety. Each of the Synoptic (Matthew, Mark and Luke) Passion narratives is read across a three-year cycle. This year, Year C, we read Luke. The Sunday of the Passion begins Holy Week, which culminates in the Easter Triduum. On Palm Sunday Christian communities begin to prepare in earnest for the celebration of Easter. At sunset on Thursday of this week the Church concludes our season of preparation, Lent, and enters its most sacred days, the Easter Triduum (TRIH-djoo-um – “*Three Days*”). The Easter Triduum, the celebration of the Lord’s Passover, is the center of the Church’s life.

## ***THE EASTER TRIDUUM: MAUNDY THURSDAY, GOOD FRIDAY, EASTER EVE***

The Easter Triduum (*TRIH-djoo-um*), the Great Three Days, begins on Maundy Thursday, April 1, 2010. Lent has ended, and we begin the celebration of the Passover of the Lord from death to life. During these Three Days Christians still reckon time according to the customs of the Jewish people. For the convenience of those who are attending the entire Triduum, the services will be compiled into one bulletin.

**Maundy Thursday is April 1.** Before the service a traditional Agape Supper will be offered in the Guild Room and Hall at 6:45 PM – the dinner is light potluck (a signup sheet is outside the Guild Room). The liturgy of the Lord's Supper begins at 7:30 PM in the church. A number of ancient rites are observed during the Celebration of the Lord's Supper, including the washing of feet. Bread and wine are consecrated for the ministration of Holy Communion, both for that evening's service and for the Good Friday Liturgy. On Maundy Thursday the Church's money offering is entirely for the poor; it will be used to support the Food Panty at Northern Westchester Community Center in Katonah. At the end of the service, the Eucharist is reposed in an ambry in the Sacristy, the altar is washed with wine and water, and the sanctuary is stripped of all ornament and furnishing. The Cross is veiled, and silence is observed after the liturgy.

**Several minor devotions** are customary between the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday and the Celebration of the Passion of the Lord on Good Friday. The first of these devotions is the **Watch**, when Christians traditionally "keep watch" for a period of time during Thursday Night or throughout the day on Friday. Good Shepherd will remain open all day on Good Friday so that anyone who wishes can pray or meditate. In addition Good Shepherd offers a traditional Lenten devotion known as the **Stations of the Cross** on Good Friday at 12:00 PM and 6:45 PM – Stations are also offered throughout Lent: Wednesdays at 6:00 PM and Fridays at 8:00 AM. For centuries, these minor devotions have been observed by some Christians in addition to the major liturgies of the Triduum.

**On Good Friday, April 2, 2010,** we celebrate the second of the great liturgies of the Easter Triduum, the Celebration of the Passion of the Lord. The worship and ceremonies of the Church on Good Friday are for many Christians the most powerful of the Church year. The liturgy begins with the priest prostrate before the altar and the people kneeling. Following the Liturgy of the Word and the Passion Narrative from Saint John, the Church offers its prayers in a form used by the ancient Church, a form now used only on Good Friday. Then we are invited to participate in the Showing of the Cross to praise the resurrection of the Lord. Finally we receive Holy Communion from the Sacrament consecrated at the

Celebration of the Lord's Supper. Silence is observed before and after the liturgy. Like Maundy Thursday, there is no after service greeting or reception until the conclusion of the Great Vigil of Easter.

**The Great Vigil of Easter, celebrated on Saturday night, April 3, 2010,** is the final part of a service which began on Maundy Thursday. It begins in an Upper Room. It ends at a tomb wherein Christ rises from the dead. In the dark we await the light that proclaims the resurrection. Then we share that light. The ceremonies of this night are about death and life, about an old Adam and a new Adam, about an apple, about bees, and about the smell of blood, both at death and at birth. The central Christian belief is that Jesus was crucified and he rose from the dead. In the liturgical tradition of the Church this is not a past or an abstract reality. The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ is remembered and made present in our worship and in our common life. "Jesus Christ, yesterday and today, the Beginning and End, Alpha and Omega. His are all times and ages. To him be glory and dominion through all eternity." Before the service there will be a pasta potluck dinner – a signup sheet is in the hall. After the Vigil, a champagne and chocolate reception will be held in the hall!

All are welcome to attend any or all of the services of the Triduum. If you have never experienced the Paschal Mystery as it unfolds over the Great Three Days, I highly recommend setting these three evenings aside during Holy Week. It's an awesome celebration!

### ***EASTER DAY: THE SUNDAY OF THE RESURRECTION***

The Sunday of the Resurrection, Easter Sunday, is April 4, 2010. The central Christian belief is that Jesus was crucified and rose from the dead. In our worship this is not a past or an abstract reality. The death and resurrection of Jesus Christ is remembered and made present in our worship and in our common life. "Jesus Christ, yesterday and today, the Beginning and End, Alpha and Omega. His are all times and ages. To him be glory and dominion through all eternity." "Easter" is the English language name for the Sunday of the Resurrection. In most languages, the given name is some form of the word "Passover." Easter celebrates the "Passover" of Jesus from death to life. The date of Easter, though a matter of controversy at different points in history, has always been connected with the conjunction of the lunar and solar calendars. For Western Christians, Easter Day is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the Spring equinox. Easter Day cannot be earlier than March 22 or later than April 25. The service will be followed by an Easter Egg hunt.

## ***THROUGHOUT LENT***


**Stations of the Cross** will be offered throughout Lent on Wednesday evenings (beginning on February 24) at 6:00 PM and on Friday mornings (beginning on February 19) at 8:00 AM. Stations of the Cross is a devotional service – you can go more than once and the more you go the more you will get out of it. The words of the service are deeply rooted in scripture. A number of the stations are taken directly from Gospel accounts of the Passion and quote extensively from the New Testament. Other stations are traditional events that are not narrated in the New Testament, but quote extensively from Old Testament passages that prefigure or predict the Passion of Christ. The most common pattern used in churches these days is fourteen stations with an optional fifteenth station of the Resurrection. At various times the common practice had been to observe as few as seven stations and as many as thirty-three stations.

## ANNUAL REVIEW: IZAVA PARISH

He met with the parish committee, the Mama Lishes, the children, and their guardians to discuss the program with them. Some of their comments are recorded below:

**Committee Members:** The Committee Members at Izava are all working hard to ensure that the program continues to progress. They expressed their thanks to their supporters in New York for the help the children are receiving. They say that the children are studying hard in their lessons, and their health has continued to improve over the last year. The entire committee is happy that their parish is included within The Carpenter's Kids program, and they promise to work hard to ensure that the program continues to progress without any problems. "Thank you, our friends!"

**Mama Lishes:** The Mama Lishes (the women who cook the children breakfast) are grateful for the opportunity to work for the children each morning. Since they have been serving as Mama Lishes they have seen a great improvement in the children's attention span, attendance at school, and academic performance. They are happy to see how the children have changed over the past year since they are receiving more food, and they are thankful for their friends in New York!

**Guardians and Parents:** The parents and guardians expressed their sincere thanks for your help in continuing to support the program in Izava. The program is helping them to support their children, and for that they are very grateful. Their children are attending school every day and enjoying learning with their peers. They ask that God will bless you for your kind hearts and for the generosity you have shown to them.

**Children:** The children at Izava were all very excited to receive their new shoes, uniforms, and school supplies, and they were especially excited when they received five pairs of socks and bars of soap. They promise to continue to study hard in school and work hard to help their parents. They thank you very much for the gifts you have given to them. "Asanteni sana rafiki zetu!" (Thank you very much, our friends!)

**Assistant Director:** Izava parish has continued to do well with The Carpenter's Kids program. The children all looked very healthy, happy, and well-cared for. It is wonderful to see that the program is progressing and that the children are showing the benefits of the program. The committee members and guardians are all working together to make sure that the children are taken care of and that the program is operating without any major issues. We will continue to visit Izava each year to ensure that everything is running smoothly.

## ***“WHY I LOVE GOOD SHEPHERD”***

We first came to Good Shepherd in the summer of 1984 when my daughter Michelle was 9 years old. Her Brownie troop buddy invited us to attend a Sunday service with her family. It happened to be a “folk Sunday” which was held once a month. Fr. Dresser gave a children's sermon using a puppet named Gloria and the music was light and uplifting. Michelle looked forward to returning, and although I was raised in the Presbyterian Church, and the Episcopal Church seemed a bit foreign to me, I was glad that she wanted to come back so I decided we should give it a try. At coffee hour the first people we met were the Stebbins and the Sotters. They were warm and friendly and made us feel welcome. That was over 25 years ago. Since then I have been involved with Sunday School, Altar Guild, Lay Readers, Ushers, WOCOGs and Vestry. I have made so many more friendships... and it all started with a simple “Hi, my name is.....Welcome to Good Shepherd!”.

What I love most about Good Shepherd is the real sense of family. I have felt God's hand at work in this parish time and time again. Over the years, as a parish family, we have overcome some huge bumps in the road. Like most families, we have had some major disagreements and rifts. But even in those times, the issues never rose above our love and concern for one another. Whenever someone was hurting, we circled the wagons, dropped all other issues, and did whatever we could to take care of them. There were some years

when there were more funerals than we thought we could bear, among them two precious children, which broke our hearts. But it was then that I learned we are God's gift to each other. The faith and hope that we share supports us and helps us heal.

I can see that good things are happening now. The enthusiasm and sense of expectation is palpable; much of which is attributable to Fr. Matt's enthusiasm and energy. We are growing in numbers and in fellowship. I see new faces every week, and the sound of chattering children streaming in from Sunday school during the 10:00 AM service gives confirmation that we are a living, thriving parish. The fact that nearly 100 family and friends attended the 12<sup>th</sup> Night celebration is exciting. I am certain that we are on a good path and things will only get better.

We came looking... we stayed because we found what we were looking for.... I hope that those who are new to Good Shepherd will come to feel this sense of family as well and stay with us for a long time to come.

## ***THE PASSION OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST: ADULT EDUCATION & CONFIRMATION CLASSES***

Parts of the Gospel accounts of the Passion are read every year during Holy Week (Matthew, Mark & Luke are read in a three year cycle on Palm/Passion Sunday; John is read every year on Good Friday). The narratives of Jesus' death and resurrection are the heart of the Gospels. The texts are better, richer and more interesting than any movie. The class will be offered on Sundays at 9:00 AM and again on Tuesdays at 6:00 PM (The Tuesday class will repeat what was covered on Sunday). This class is designed both for **adults** and also for **young people who wish to be Confirmed** by the Bishop in June. This class is open to everyone. It is a wonderful opportunity for people who recently discovered or rediscovered Christ to learn about their faith. It can serve as a helpful refresher for Christians who want to recharge their spiritual batteries. It is a fantastic way for any Christian to prepare for Holy Week & Easter. The class is being offered twice each week in the hopes that more people will be able to find a way to fit it into their schedules. Food and beverages are welcome at both classes.
