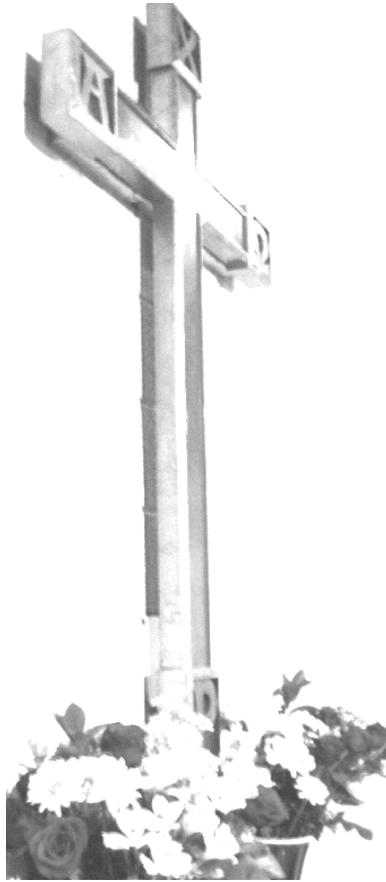

RECTOR'S REPORT

I want to begin by thanking the members and friends of Good Shepherd for their warm welcome. My wife, Nicole, our children Liam and Nicholas, and I have been welcomed into the Good Shepherd family in more ways than I can count. The first contact I had with anyone at Good Shepherd was from the Search Committee co-chairs, Amanda Slattery and Bruce Barber. We next met the other members of the Search Committee and then the Vestry. The welcome that those representatives gave us was marvelous and it has continued to this day. It is such a blessing to be here. We love living in Granite Springs. I am honored to be your rector. Thanks so much & God bless you!

One of my primary concerns as rector is parish growth. The average Sunday attendance for 2009 was 63 people. The average Sunday attendance between Sunday, September 20, (my first Sunday) and Sunday, December 27, (the last Sunday of 2009) has been 84. We had the most people in attendance for Christmas services since 2001. Our goal for 2010 is to average more than 100 people every Sunday. I know that this is a realistic goal because I know that the parish wants to grow and because the parish is currently growing. Every Sunday people visit (for the first time ever or for the first time in a long time), and more often than not, those people come back the next week. The reason the parish is growing is because the people at Good Shepherd love their parish and express that love in word and deed to their family, friends, neighbors, and Sunday morning visitors.

The parish is growing financially as well. The pledge numbers for 2010 are not yet finalized – if you have yet made a pledge, please consider being part of the Every Member Stewardship Campaign of 2010 – and so far we have nearly \$85,000 pledged: according to the parochial reports of the parish filed with the Diocese each year, this is the first time in the history of the parish that the Stewardship Campaign has surpassed \$80,000! The goal for 2010 remains \$120,000 – and we need that amount pledged to close our budget deficit for 2010 – but the growth so far towards financial stability is fantastic. I believe that we can make this goal too once every member understands that their support, whatever the amount, is essential for the wellbeing and prosperity of Good Shepherd.

The day to day life of being a priest in Granite Springs has been rewarding. Because I am blessed to live next to the church, I am able to offer Morning Prayer five days each week. All are welcome to join me, and I am happy to report that there are a few regulars at the midweek services. In addition to that basic schedule we are now offering a more expanded liturgical schedule on Holy Days: Morning and Evening Prayer, each followed by the Holy Eucharist. Greater Holy Days during the liturgical year will be celebrated with music at the 6:00 PM service and after-service festivities. We had a good crowd for both Thanksgiving and Holy Name (New Year's Day). The smaller group that came to Epiphany had a blast, but we all agreed the service would have been best followed by wine and cheese: next year it will be! Throughout 2010 I hope to establish a working pattern for the Major Holy Days. Most of them will be linked to a festive food celebration (e.g. Candlemas with Chili & Chowder; Annunciation with Wine Tasting, etc.).

There are a number of Christian Education opportunities at Good Shepherd. Our Sunday School, as you will read in the Sunday School report, is thriving. I am also able to offer a weekly morning Bible Study for adults. We have been studying the prophets for months (it's a big picture class) and we will continue to study them until we are done (by summer I hope). On Sunday mornings I have offered a variety of classes. So far the most popular class has been the Passion class (which is repeated on Tuesday evenings). I am thrilled that there is so much interest in the central Gospel accounts of the Passion.

The attendance at the Passion class is of course influenced by the fact that the teenagers who are to be confirmed are in attendance with the adults. Bishop Sisk is visiting in June and we have more than half a dozen Confirmands. They will study the Passion Narratives until Easter. You may have also noticed they have been reading the New Testament Lesson on Sunday; this practice will continue, and you may also see them acting as ushers as well. After Easter we will meet in more informal gatherings to discuss some basics of what it means to be an adult Christian and Episcopalian. One of my primary goals for 2010 is to establish a Youth Group. We have the bare bones of one, and the Confirmation class has gotten us off to a good start. Our Sunday School is very successful and continues to grow... with a Youth Group we will have more expanded opportunities for children of all ages and young adults. Pray that next year's annual report will enumerate the many things done in 2010 by the Youth Group.

In November, 2009, we began to offer child care on Sundays, under the direction of Ms. Sharen McKenna. The offering has been an astounding success. Most Sundays there are 5-7 children in the room. At the rate we are going we will need a second care giver. I have heard from many families that they are thrilled to have the option of child care every Sunday morning.

There are several parishioners who are in nursing homes and others who were hospitalized in 2009. I try to visit and bring communion to people in hospital as often as possible and to people in nursing homes once a week. Sometimes I discover an empty room, so I always bring a bulletin or a card so that there is some obvious note from the church. Such visits are not reserved for the priest alone; parishioners regularly make visits to family and friends in the hospital and nursing homes. If you want me to visit someone you know, or if you want me to visit you, please let me know. I have a car, and I will make a visit with the Sacrament as soon as possible.

I discovered that there was a great amount of outreach going on at Good Shepherd, but I soon learned that some of those outreach efforts were often unknown to the entire congregation. Communication is always important: it is important to let everyone know what is going on. With that in mind, the Outreach Committee is now meeting monthly to discuss current and future outreach efforts. Support of the Carpenter's Kid's Program has been very strong and continues to be a great example of Good Shepherd's international outreach. Regional outreach is done in many ways, but primarily through the parish's support of the Diocese of New York. I serve on a number of Diocesan Committees, including but not limited to the Hispanic Grant Committee and the Congregational Support Plan Committee. Those two committees, funded by the Diocese, provide millions of dollars every year to support the work of congregations in the diocese, many of them located in the most economically depressed areas. Paying our assessment matters, not because we have to pay "taxes", but rather because half of our assessment goes directly to supporting the regional and local mission and outreach of the diocese and the other half supports the day-to-day life and work of the Cathedral and Diocesan staff. On the local level, the church continues to open its doors to various groups including AA and Bright Beginnings and for local elections. In addition, Good Shepherd supports the Katonah Food Pantry with supplies. This past year the harvest offering was expanded to be a regular monthly offering of the parish. Our witness to the love of God in Christ is often most evident in basic outreach and mission to those in our community, our region, and around the world. There are a number of other outreach opportunities to be involved in at Good Shepherd beyond those noted above, if you are interested in outreach or if you are already involved in an outreach program and would like more support from the church, please come to one of the Outreach Committee Meetings.

All of the events and services that Good Shepherd has during the year are attended because people know about them in advance. An event that is poorly advertized is often poorly attended. Communication in the parish has been a concern of mine since I was elected rector. I updated the parish website which includes a detailed – and up to date – calendar of all church and parish events. The parish database continues to be updated on a regular basis. I have created an email list and regularly send out a “newsfeed” noting upcoming events. In addition, major events have been advertised weekly in the church bulletin and monthly in the Shepherd’s Voice. I think that is a good start. Outside advertisement remains a difficulty. We have been helped by Granite Springs Road being a regular route on car GPS systems and as a result, the banners placed on the church property are seen by many people every day. Still, work remains for 2010: for example, the email list is not complete and will always need updates, we do not have “Good Shepherd” letterhead or envelopes, there are no signs outside to let visitors know that there is a parish office, and the main banner advertising services times is difficult to read (due to its angle and location) when driving by. Small changes make a big difference when it comes to communication. A great welcome begins with communication. If someone knows exactly what is happening at Good Shepherd, that person is far more likely to consider coming to an event or service. Knowing that there is work to be done does not overshadow the fact that 2009 was a great year in terms of communication: we know that the word is getting out about Good Shepherd because the parish is growing!

There are many more reports below which do more than I possibly can to show what a wonderful parish Good Shepherd is. Thanks to all who have donated time at meetings, planning and hosting activities, cleaning and repairing the church property, volunteering any time, being friendly and welcoming at the door, and making Good Shepherd the special place that it is. Thanks in particular to the vestry members and to Jim and Phil our wardens for all the time and hard work they have put in throughout the year. Thank you especially to Cecilia Sparacio, organist and choir director, Cindy Sotter, secretary, and Anne Siemerling, sexton: the staff at Good Shepherd works very hard, and they are greatly appreciated. Thanks so much for a wonderful 2009. I am so happy and blessed to be rector of this wonderful place. God bless you all!

PROPERTY WARDEN'S REPORT

2009 was a great year. A big part of the search for Fr. Matthew Mead was getting the property up to date since the rectory is part of the rector's employment package. We did some updating before Fr. Troy Beecham, the previous rector, moved in, but more needed to be done. With the help of some donations of money and time and our treasury we got it done. I would like to list here the larger capital improvement done in the church, parish hall, rectory and grounds, and how much these cost. The companies that did the work gave us below market prices some way below.

- Good Shepherd social activities normally include meals. The stove we had was old did not heat evenly and was dangerous. Mr. Keogel donated the buildings on this property and he set up a trust fund held by the diocese. We can use the interest only for capital repairs and improvements. We used the money to cover most of the cost of the stove. Cost of a new stove: \$2750.00
- The rectory needed a new Refrigerator. The Diocese granted us the money for that: \$729
- There were several trees that were in danger of falling on the building. Charles tree company cut and removed 6 trees and trimmed along the driveway: \$3,200
- The inside of the rectory need to be painted, the work was done by Lanza Bros. Painting: \$4,500
- The garage door was repaired by Bill Reynolds, Jr. Garage doors, Inc.: \$ 215
- The upper part of the fire place chimney was falling apart and needed repair. Fr Patrick Ward, the interim rector, helped James Kane with that job: \$637.93
- The Rectory needed a new rug on the second floor from Freight Liquidators: \$1365
- The Septic tanks needed maintenance. \$1,110.00
- J P Mc Hale for Carpenter treatment: \$650

In 2009 the music at Good Shepherd began going through a metamorphosis. At the beginning of the year, Fr. Patrick's style had us singing many of our favorite hymns. With Fr. Every Sunday from now on, before each service, I will run through the hymns with you for that morning. Come 15 minutes early to sing with me, and build a new relationship with these hymns. In addition, in February or March we are planning an evening or afternoon of hymn singing. Hymnals and books with songs of praise will be available for you to look at so we can choose some of your favorites, as well as try new hymns.

The choir is still a small band made up of a core of seven. We are a welcoming, fun-loving group of music makers who would love to have more voices join our forces. If you like singing, come sit with us (even if you think you don't have "a voice"). Encourage your family to sing as it is a wonderful way to participate in the Sunday service.

The budget for purchasing music has primarily gone for paying instrumentalists, and a singer for Easter and Christmas Eve. For us to continue to have our instrumentalists, and keep our singer (I'd love to add a trumpet for Easter), contributions to the Helen Moore Fund are exclusively used for that purpose. These two special seasons are enhanced by these musicians. Please give to this fund so we can continue.

With a growing number of services being offered by Fr. Matt, the music ministry will be growing along side.

SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE REPORT

The Sunday School experienced another enjoyable--and growing--year in 2009. A few new families joined the church, resulting in more children joining our program. We now have about 25 children attending Sunday School on a regular basis. Most of them are third grade or younger, and are a delight to work with.

No example of that is better than the just-presented Christmas pageant, which was held January 9, 2010, in conjunction with our fourth annual "12th Night" celebration. We presented a new play and showed off a new set this year! The majority of the children were performing in their first or second pageant, and they did a wonderful job acting, singing and telling the story of Jesus' birth. We even had "live animals" and a "live" Baby Jesus again (thank you, Nicholas Mead!)

The following 12th Night celebration, also organized by the Sunday School, was an evening of food, fellowship and festivity, with the Magi (David Kaprielian, Katherine Kordys and Vilma Mulholland) bringing gifts for everyone. Father Matt led us in a church service to conclude the evening. Thanks to everyone for their generous donations of food and gifts, and to the organizing committee, especially Arleen Flury and Leslie Fulton, for making it happen.

Sunday School is in its fourth year of a "lectionary-based" curriculum, which means the children are learning the same lessons (at their level) that the rest of us are learning in church. Each Sunday starts with a worship service, followed by a lesson and activity/craft before they come into church for communion. The children respond well to this format and we are told that some great family discussions have occurred after church on the lessons learned that day. The lectionary curriculum seems to be working well on many levels.

We are always looking for more teachers. We need volunteers for the upcoming spring session (after Easter). Please prayerfully consider sharing your talents with our wonderful children. They are bright, fun and easy to work with. We have five sessions during the year. Each lasts approximately six weeks. Each teacher receives a great deal of material and has the support of the Sunday School Committee. A heartfelt thank you to everyone who has answered the call to teach. You have made a real difference and hopefully have felt rewarded by your experience.

Thanks also to everyone who participated in our third annual Operation Christmas Child program. Because of your generosity we were able to send dozens of shoeboxes filled with items to children in need around the world.

We are blessed to have a "bumper crop" of young children in the program. They are our greatest asset and with your continuing support we pray that with a solid Christian education, they will be better equipped to face the world they are quickly growing up in!

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

The Stewardship Committee would like to thank everyone who supported our church this past year, both financially and with gifts of time and talent. Special thanks to those parishioners who participated in the 24-Hour Prayer Vigil and Stewardship Potluck Luncheon. Each of these functions is an expression of the worship and fellowship we share as a congregation.

Pledges: Our church budget for the coming year calls for a total of \$120,000 in pledges to keep Good Shepherd in the black. As of January 17th we have received 47 pledge cards totaling \$84,854 for the coming year. This amount represents a per family pledge of \$1805/year or \$34.72/week. We will need an additional \$35,146 in pledges to keep our church running for another year, so if you haven't made a formal pledge yet, it's critical that you do so.
