## Building Our Relationship with Our Eternal Father

It's Sunday and I'm driving back from Good Shepherd. The service, sermon, and fellowship have kindled a spirit of hope and determination to more fully live out the values of my Christian faith. Sundays are my spiritual workout day, but come Monday, I can already feel the fervor of that day behind me. Short from staying in contact with my fellow parishioners, what can I do today to make those words of the scripture jump off the page and light the fire of my week?

Take baby steps. A fire need only be a continuous flame that is fed in small regular increments rewarding the giver with warmth and light. And so I submit that in our spiritual tool box lies a familiar yet underused tool to feed that flame; prayer. It's so simple that it gets forgotten. The first step is to take it with us from church and bring it home. At mealtime and before bed, prayer may make a short appearance depending on the mood. Is that enough prayer to keep our continuous flame?

As we consider the intention of giving prayer greater space, we can ask ourselves why we haven't done it before. My answers were:

I do it enough at church.
I don't have the time.
I don't know how.

Here is how I changed the narrative:

I do it enough at church: I determined that enough was good for church but I wanted more during the week.

I don't have the time: Every change worth making I'll start small and see what requires time. happens.


I don't know how: This was a big obstacle, and an experience at Good Shepherd put me on an opening path:

A number of years ago, I volunteered to do one hour of prayer during a twenty-four hour prayer vigil. I had never prayed continually for one hour. After reading written prayers, I tried feeling connected but failed. My answer was to be honest with myself, and ask myself what experience brought me close to God. I spent the next hour hymn singing. Lesson learned...Be true and follow the path to which the spirit is drawn.

We can take our intention, and remind ourselves every day how God appears in our everyday experience. Prayer as part of our daily routine reveals and keeps open our connection with God, God who loves us and lets us know he created this beauty of nature, and he bestowed his gifts on our family and friends. Prayer is an expression of our love for God and all he gives us. It is a time where we can send up our voices of praise and thanksgiving. Prayer, when given a comfortable place and welcome invitation, can enter in and remain a holy presence.

When we pull up a chair, look out our window, and listen for our hearts to beat, a bird to sing, and the wind to rustle through the trees, our awakening of those moments is where prayer exists. From there, a deeper life of prayer is within our grasp. And as we personally grow in prayer, its dimension expands into a freedom of embracing and intertwining with other people who pray. When prayer becomes a habit, it is truly integrated into the fabric of living and becomes a lively, dependable source of strength, comfort and wonder.

#### What is EfM? The official version:

Every Christian receives the call to Christian ministry at baptism. Education for Ministry (EFM) provides the basics of a theological education in order to develop knowledge and confidence about the ministry we all share. EFM is a program of the School of Theology of the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee. Completion of the program takes four years, during which participants study the Bible, church history and 20<sup>th</sup> century theology. Participants commit one year at a time to meet weekly in seminar groups led by a trained mentor. Participants can expect to do two to four hours of homework per week outside of the seminar. 
